## COVID-19: School Operation Scenarios, Form J-13A, and Independent Study California Department of Education

The following table provides information for local educational agencies (LEAs) regarding the interaction of a Form J-13A approval, independent study, and claiming attendance for apportionment under various school operation scenarios. Non-classroom based charter schools and classroom based charter schools that primarily offer independent study due to COVID-19 should contact the California Department of Education (CDE) for instructional time and attendance accounting information by email at <a href="mailto:attendance-accounting@cde.ca.gov">attendance-accounting@cde.ca.gov</a>.
